<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Once a day 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Please read at least one picture book to your child. You can read the same book, as this has great benefits. Have them ask you questions about the book or you may ask them to retell the story in their own words. For example, “Listen carefully to the story, because you’re going to tell me the story next. Use the pictures to help them remember the story. “What happened here?”(pointing to the pictures) This will help your child develop comprehension of what they have read. It also builds their word knowledge. 	<p>Have your child write their numbers 1-20 at least twice a week. Then have them cut the numbers apart. You mix them up and let them put the numbers together in order. Have them count the numbers to you pointing to each number. You can use these same numbers to ask them each number like flash cards.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> You can dance Go Noodle on Youtube with your child if you have access to Youtube. Zoophonic songs are also on Youtube as well. They can show you the movements for all the zoophonic animals If you do not have access to youtube try some movement songs like <i>The eency weency spider went up the water spout.</i> 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Your child should be practicing writing their name. We were going to start writing their last name. Once a day. They should practice writing all the lowercase letters of the alphabet in order for practice at least twice a week.

<p>Here are some phonemic awareness games to help your student become a great reader.</p>				
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Rhyme with your child. We were just learning how to make our own Rhymes. Make it fun. They can rhyme nonsense words with real words. ● Learning to blend words orally. This will help your child to develop great listening skills for reading. 	<p>I have given you an idea for a rhyming game. Make it fun. Rhyme while you are cooking dinner. “ I can rhyme rice with spice. I can rhyme table with mable.”</p> <p>This can be a great game at home. Example “Sarah can you bring me the /p/ /encil/? You are cutting the word into two parts. You say the p sound first and make sure and leave a break or pause between the rest of the “encil” part of the word. Your child should put the word together and tell you the word. <i>Pencil</i>. Make this a fun game throughout the day.</p>

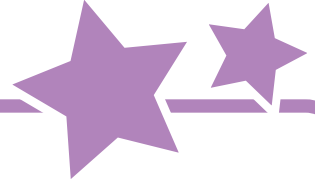

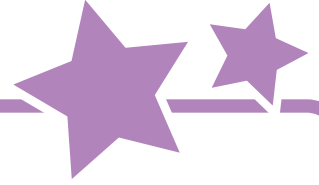

a rhyming activity

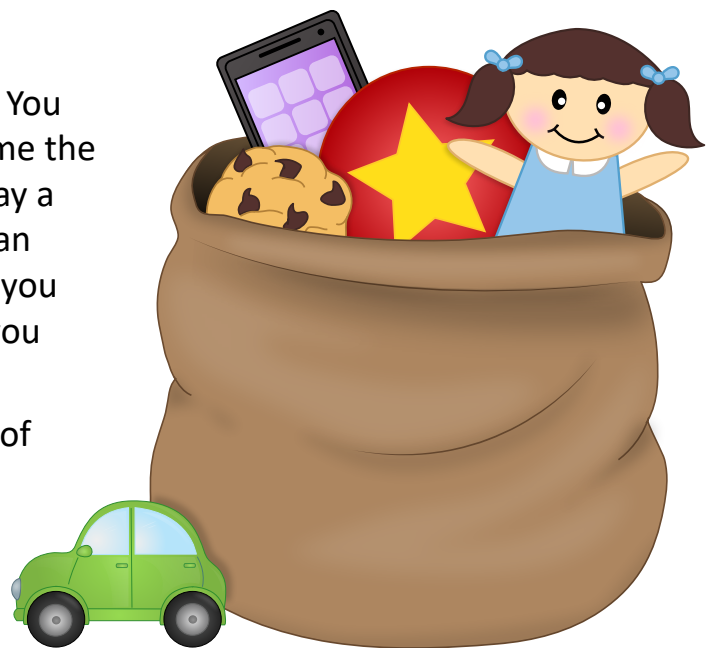

phone	cookie	letter

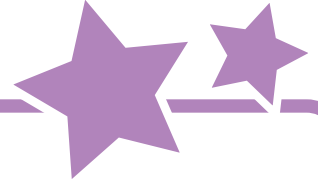
2. Put several items in the bag.
3. "We're going to play a rhyming game. You will pull items out of my bag and tell me the name of the item. Then you have to say a word that rhymes with it. This word can be a real word or a nonsense word. If you pull out a pen, you could say *hen*, or you could say a silly word like *nen!*"
4. Continue until your child has thought of rhyming words for every object.
